Dear KACCAD Volunteers, Friends and Well-Wishers;

We are happy to share our progress the second quarter and to have the opportunity once again to thank you for your support. Some of our major accomplishments of the quarter (April-June) include: completion of a spring well in Ssumbwe Parish, Wakiso District, conduction of four HIV counseling and testing events, partnership with The Real Uganda (www.therealuganda.com)- a local NGO- and continuation on our plans for an income generation activity for KACCAD. Through the quarter we have focused on outreach to and partnership with community members living in Wakiso District as well as with some global partners. Our community partnerships have made the HIV testing events and well construction possible. Our global partnerships have also made possible the well project and have opened doors to developing a stronger KACCAD with help from international volunteers.

Our appreciation goes out to Alan Bradley of Ireland who designed a website for KACCAD that was launched this quarter which is www.volunteerkaccad.org. Our sincere thanks also go to Alan Bradley's father for sponsoring the website. Please check out the website and let us know what you think. We are really excited for this advancement of KACCAD and the opportunity to reach out to a greater community as we develop. KACCAD extends its gratitude to Operation PASS Along, a Ministry of Hill Speak, in conjunction with Kurz's family for continued collection of reading materials and shipment to our community library. We distribute these materials to local schools and other wise make them available to community residents.



We extend a special thanks to the Milholland family and the numerous others who contributed to and organized funds for the Ssumbwe well project. Support from Port Townsend, WA community members and other friends from the US helped us bring clean water to over 840 people in Ssumbwe! This gift to the community will help support health and wellbeing of some of the poorest community members in the district. We chose Ssubwwe, Wakiso District as the first community to prioritize for a water project because the majority of the water sources in the parish are in mal repair, are broken or have not been developed. This is not unique of the district but the water problems in this particular parish are severe. In Ssubwwe Parish of Wakiso there are a total of 12 wells for over 10,150 people. An average of 845 people use each well. Before construction of the newly built Ssubwwe well, only three wells were in functioning condition in the parish (Baseline survey report 2006). The others nine “wells” in mal repair could be more accurately called stagnant pools. Contaminants such as cholera, schistosomiasis, amebic dysentery, other water borne diseases and waste products pollute these wells. These infections especially pelage residents in the area during the rainy season when flooding causes severe contamination. Due to the lack of prohibitive barriers, people also share these undeveloped wells with animals that can not be kept out. Thus, animal waste mixes with the water further reducing its quality. Human waste similarly mixes with the water due to the fact that few families have toilets in good repair and thus excreta outside. For community members who are generally very poor it is not an option to hire transportation to travel to the few developed wells in the parish.

Ssubwwe was also chosen by KACCAD as the first target area because residents expressed readiness and commitment to build a well. Each time we visited the community residents who are familiar with other projects conducted by KACCAD made sure to remind us of there needs and even to bring us to some of the water sources serving the community. It was the residents of Ssubwwe who selected the highest priority water source for well development and did all the non-technical labour for the project: site clearing, haling materials and assisting the contractor in construction. Women, men and children organized work, repair and maintenance committees. With their hard work the well was complete in less than two and ½ weeks of work!

The Completed Well!

The well constructed in Ssubwwe is a spring well. Spring wells are common in Wakiso District and have proven to be most economical, sustainable and long lasting of the wells constructed in the area. Because they are common, expertise for well construction is easy to find as are needed materials. Building a spring well requires piping the natural spring and constructing a structure to hold the water over flow and divert it into an already existing out flow. The structure requires steps and a platform for people fetching water to stand on so they are not forced to step in the water to collect it.

To support the sustainability of the Ssubwwe well, residents receiving sensitization on water purification, avoiding water contamination, water-borne illnesses and well maintenance provided by the District Health services. Residents also formed committees to maintain the well and fences off the ground under which the main piping run to avoid impact over time from walking on piping and keep animals from contaminating the spring. This training and the maintenance efforts of community members using this well the will enable Ssubwwe residents to live more healthful lives both today and in the future.

In preparation for our ongoing water and sanitation work, KACCAD visited many wells in the Ssubwwe and Nakabugo parish area in June with the contractor who led the first well construction project to assess the repair work that can be done. As we continue working on water and sanitation projects in our sub-county, we hope to develop natural springs, hand Dug well and repair existing springs and hand Dug wells. Our work on water and sanitation will depend on resources available and grant or other funding. As we move forward, our experience in building the Ssubwwe well will help foster community and funding support.

In addition to the work KACCAD is doing to find funding for well and water sanitation projects, Port Townsend, WA community members and especially the Milholland family are working to organize funds for well repair of wells in the district. Any assistance on well projects will go along way in serving many hundreds of people in our community.

Through our partnership with Bbira AIDS Community, Rescue Widows, Elderly, Youth and Orphans Affected with AIDS (RWEYOWA) and United Affected Organization (UAO), KACCAD was conducted mobilization through a network of HIV/AIDS community counselors, youth volunteers and KACCAD volunteers for HIV testing events held at Namasuba, Makindye Sub-County, Wakiso District in April (attendance 150, 97 tested, 7 positive); Bbira Church of Uganda in May (attendance 153, 143 tested, 17 positive); Ku Mwenda in June (attendance 221, tested 162, positive 18) and Buloba in June (attendance 156, tested 113, positive 7). Uganda's AIDS Information Center (AIC) provided HIV testing at all events while KACCAD volunteers lead educational games, HIV sensitization and organized attendants into groups for testing. Just using word of mouth and hand made posters we were able to draw 680 people for testing and to test 515 people! The large amount of people in attendance at these events shows the importance the community places on this service. Also the rate of people testing positive at our events, 49 out of 515, shows that HIV/AIDS is having a huge impact on our community with almost 10% of people tested testing HIV positive.

Our partnership with AIC has allowed us to offer a great service to the community. Sadly they are presently dealing with funding issues and will be unable to offer the service to us at no cost. As this is an important service to our community, we will be looking for ways to cover this cost. AIC requires a minimum of 60,000 shillings an event. We require 30,000-60,000 for outreach. Making the announcement on a megaphone from a motorcycle allows us to reach a wide community but does require some funding as does poster making. In the approximate cost per event is \$70.

Leading HIV testing mobilization and organizing these events is just part of KACCAD's program to offer HIV/AIDS information and support services to people living in Wakiso Sub-County. After taking a brake during school holidays, we are continuing our HIV/AIDS, health and life skills sensitization work with secondary and vocational school students in Kikaaya Parish and looking out for other groups to work with. As a long term project we are also exploring training secondary teachers in the sub-county on incorporation HIV/AIDS and life skills information into their curriculums. Though we find ourselves constricted by resources, our desire to serve keeps driving us forward.

Our program of HIV/AIDS education is also expanding to reach more schools. Amanda Milholland and Musisi Sam are working with three schools including two vocational schools and a secondary school in Kikaaya Village. Vocational students are studying tailoring and catering at one school and a variety of topics including computers and mechanics at the other vocational school. At the secondary school we are working with students in senior one through six. We come once a week to each school to do presentations and workshops focused on life skills and HIV/AIDS. Our classes this quarter have focused on setting goals; identifying role models and qualities that are admirable and which we want to emulate; HIV/AIDS transmission, prevention and myths and facts about sexual health and HIV/AIDS. Classes have as few as 25 students and as many as 90. In this quarter we have taught a total of 15 classes and over 300 students.

We are very pleased to welcome Sarah Riley from New York State, USA to the KACCAD volunteer team. Sarah joined KACCAD on June 15th as a volunteer through a program called Real Uganda. She, a first year student at Amherst University, will be working with us for two months. Sarah is interested in women and youth education and currently developed a lesson plan to teach reading and writing, life skills to dropouts at Hajji Kiyemba memorial tailoring institute. She has experience working with elementary school students and as a mentor. We are excited for the opportunity to put her skills to use and help her develop still other skills through her work as part of our team. Inspired by the tremendous work we have seen accomplished by Real Uganda volunteers in our community, Wakiso District and Uganda, we sought partnership with the organization at the end of April and were pleasantly rewarded with a volunteer for June 15th- and August 15th. We are hopeful for a strong continued partnership with The Real Uganda (TRU) over the coming years.

In our community we have seen the impact of The Real Uganda volunteers who have been involved with building schools, teaching children and in many other projects. These volunteers often completed their service in Uganda with their hearts deeply touched by their experience. Some have returned to our sub-county to continue on school construction projects or have fundraised from their home country to support other projects that have had significant impact on the communities served. We hope that Sarah and other volunteers can find themselves similarly embraced and inspired during their stay with us so we may continue to build international friendships.

We are working diligently to developing an income generation activity for KACCAD. As KACCAD encourages self-sufficiency and sustainable projects within our service area, we likewise see the deep need for our organization to develop towards these goals. KACCAD has written a grant to the US Embassy that, if funded, will enable us to begin chicken and pig farming for income generation. Previously KACCAD was running a rotating pig rearing scheme that helped 58 families begin pig farming. An additional 11 families have been helped to begin chicken and cow rearing. At present these schemes are mostly halted though many farmers started by KACCAD continue give back to the project and maintain animal rearing for income generation. We have learned a lot from these projects and have used both the example of their successes and failures to develop a stronger business plan for this new generation of the KACCAD farm and animal rotation scheme. It is still a goal of the project to help needy Wakiso Sub-County residents begin farming. A major change in our focus is that we have put priority of developing the project to sustainability and profitability before we will look to meet community needs. In this way, we are planning for longer term benefits instead of looking for quick solutions that can not hold together. We are happy to share our grant proposal with you if you would like more information about KACCAD's farming plans. Look out for future developments and opportunities to get involved with this exciting project.

As we continue into our third quarter we are happy to look back and see that with your support we have accomplished a lot. Still, there is along road ahead of us as an organization and in our service to Wakiso District residents. Slowly by slowly-a phrase used here to describe the path forward-we continue. We sincerely appreciated your partnership on this path! Thank you

again to all those who contributed to the well project, website development and sponsorship, supplying our libraries, supporting administrative costs and all other who have encouraged and enabled us over the quarter. Take care and God bless!

KACCAD Mission and Vision

We continue to revise and clarify our objectives.

Vision:

Vulnerable communities in Wakiso District are empowered and self-sufficient with their health, education and income generation needs met.

Mission:

To raise the standard of living of underprivileged people in Wakiso District through provision of HIV/AIDS, health and education support, vocational skills development and start up resources for income generation.

Goals:

- By 2012, women, youth and OVCs in Wakiso Sub-County and surrounding communities will have increased access to quality HIV/AIDS counseling and testing and HIV/AIDS related health education and support services.
- By 2012, at least 150 presently out of school OVCs in Wakiso Sub-County and surrounding communities will receive school sponsorship and education support.
- By 2012, low-income earners, HIV/AIDS infected and affected families, teen mothers and people with disabilities living in Wakiso Sub-County will have increased access to skills development opportunities and income generation support.

Objectives:

- By 2012, KACCAD will provide HIV/AIDS sensitization to at least 3,500 in-school youth in Wakiso Sub-County and surrounding communities. As a result, involved youth will be better able to avoid HIV infection reducing the prevalence of HIV in our youth population.
- By 2012, KACCAD will provide HIV/AIDS training and support in HIV/AIDS curriculum development to a male and female teacher in participating secondary school in Wakiso Sub-County. As result, secondary schools will be equipped with needed information and skills to start HIV/AIDS prevention programs in their schools.
- By 2012, at least 3,000 women, out-of-school youth and people affected and infected by HIV/AIDS will receive HIV/AIDS prevention and related health sensitization. As result, these vulnerable communities will be better able to avoid HIV infection reducing the prevalence of HIV in our communities.
- By 2012, KACCAD, in collaboration with partner agencies, will facilitate access to HIV counseling and testing for at least 3,500 women, youth, people with disabilities and OVCs in Wakiso Sub-County and surrounding areas. As a result, these people will have increased knowledge of their HIV status and methods of HIV/AIDS transmission and prevention.
- By 2012, 35 low income youth in Wakiso Sub-County will be provided with tailoring training and a sewing machine as part of KACCAD's existing revolving scheme. As a result, at least 5 youth will start profitable tailoring business.
- By 2012, 30 out-of-school youth will receive training in carpentry from the 25 already trained youth who have received tools and support for work space from KACCAD. As a result, at least 15 new youth will be successfully involved in carpentry for IGA.
- By 2012, KACCAD, in collaboration with individuals and partner agencies, will facilitate access to school sponsorships and education support for at least 150 OVCs in additional to the 48 OVCs already provided for by KACCAD Donors. As a result, 150 more vulnerable youth will go back to school or will have the opportunity to attend school for the first time increasing their potential to acquire profitable employment and life skills.
- By 2012, KACCAD will provide a minimum of 75 piglets to low-income groups in addition to the 58 families (as of January 2007) that have received piglets as part of KACCAD's rotating scheme. Recipients will also be trained in financial and business management and piggery farming skills. As a result, at least 60 individuals or farming cooperatives will be enabled to maintain pig farming as a profitable income generating activity.
- By 2012, KACCAD will provide a minimum of 700 chickens to cooperatives of low-income people. Groups will be provided with financial and business management and poultry rearing training as way of increasing sustainability of the

project. As result, at least 25% of participating groups will be enabled to maintain poultry farming as an income generation activity or as way to support group nutrition.

At present, it is estimated that almost 50% of the population in Wakiso District does not have access to safe drinking water. In Ssumbwe Parish 12 wells serve over 10,150 people. Of these 12, only three are in good functioning condition (2002 census). The others nine “wells” could be more accurately called stagnant pools. Contaminants such as cholera, schistosomiasis, amebic dysentery, other water borne diseases and waste products pollute these wells. Your support is helping us provide clean water to over 840 people in Ssumbwe! This gift to the community will help support health and wellbeing of some of the poorest community members in the district.

We are happy to inform you that we have started clearing the site for construction along with residents who will benefit from the well. The community surrounding the well has shown its commitment and support of the project by enthusiastically jumping into work clearing the site in preparation for construction. Women, men and children are working together shovels in hand. Residents are also receiving sensitization on water purification, avoiding water contamination, water-borne illnesses and well maintenance. These measures will enable Ssumbwe residents to live more healthful lives both today and in the future.

Sponsor a Family!

There are many families in Wakiso Sub-County that are in need of empowerment and start up resources in order to meet their needs for food, health, safety, sanitation and education. As the proverb says: "If you give a man a fish, you

will feed him for a day. If you teach him how to fish you will feed him for a life time.” Your donation in partnership with KACCAD will give a family both the resources and skills to empower them to earn living or to support their health. You provide the donation and KACCAD will provide the needed training and connection between your family and theirs. Families selected for your sponsorship were identified based on greatest need during KACCAD’s conduction of the base line survey. Needs and recourses requested by families include: latrine construction, home repairs, purchasing of mosquito nets, construction and stocking of a pig sty or chicken house for income generation for a family with over ten dependants or school sponsorship. Many families use latrines that are falling apart and are dangerous to the users. Families often can not afford to purchase mosquito nets or do home repairs. Building a pig sty or chicken house will help a family start an income generation activity. Costs for meeting these needs per family follow. If you have questions about any listed project or would like to give to a family to meet needs not listed please let us know.

- Pig Sty Construction, 1 Pig and feeds for the pig for 6 Months \$1,009
- Poultry House, 100 Birds and Food for 7 Months \$1,131
- Latrine Construction-Including Materials and Technical Labour \$694
- Treated Mosquito Net \$15 each x the number of family members (average 10-25 members including orphaned children and other children cared for by families)
- Construction of a three bedroom with kitchen for needy families \$ 2,100
- Spring well each \$1,500 or hand dug well each \$ 2,145

Volunteer opportunities with KACCAD

Join the KACCAD team in serving most vulnerable community members in Wakiso District of Uganda. There are many opportunities for your support and sharing of skills. We invite you to come live and work with us in Bulenga, Wakiso or help as a volunteer from your home community. Volunteer opportunities are open to all people, regardless of ability. Children under the age of 15 should be attended by parents but may participate in their home country while 18 years old and above can come and live with us to serve needy communities. We are especially looking for people to help support projects in pig and poultry house construction and repairs, home repairs, health/HIV/AIDS, youth and child education, animal rearing, water and sanitation (including well construction), construction of a Volunteer centre, vocational skills development, project planning and management or other skills that can help us transform our community. You do not need construction skills to join our team of builders in repairing homes and latrines of most needy community members or pig sties at the KACCAD farm.

KACCAD is an all volunteer run and supported organization. Volunteerism is central to sustaining KACCAD as an organization. KACCAD has had and continues to maintain relationships with volunteers from around the world: United Kingdom, Sweden, Holland, Germany, Ireland and United States. Volunteers have worked on projects including: supporting education in local schools, library set up for local schools, mobilization of funds for KACCAD programs, web design, community HIV/AIDS and health sensitization, school fees sponsorships, outreach and needs assessment and other projects.

Unlike other NGOs, KACCAD does not require that you make a large contribution in addition to your support as a volunteer. Volunteers who come to work with us in Uganda will be placed in private lodging or with a home stay family. You will be expected to pay for your housing and food. Depending on the type of living conditions you prefer (private dwelling or home stay), your room cost will range between 100,000 Ugandan shillings (\$68 US) single room to 200,000 Ugandan Shillings double room (\$136 US) per month. Your housing will be organized by KACCAD Staff based on your preferences. Food cost will depend on your eating habits. For local food expect an average of \$3 a day. Donations to support KACCAD are much appreciated and will be well used during your stay and participation as a volunteer.
